For the study purpose purposive Sampling Technique has used.. Structured questionnaire & Interviews with faculty and administrators have used as Tools for Data Collection.

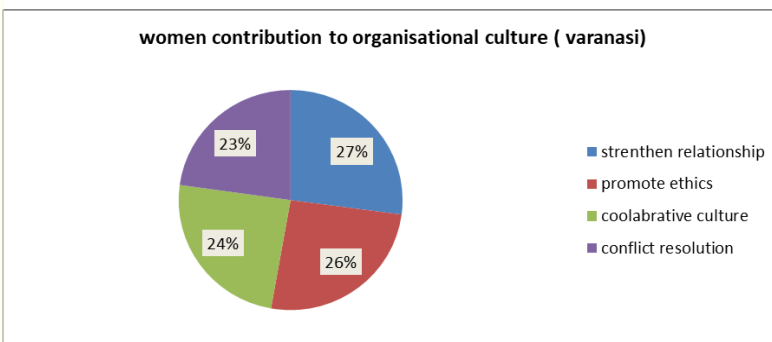
6. Data Analysis and Interpretation

6.2 Women's Contribution to Organizational Culture in Varanasi Institutions

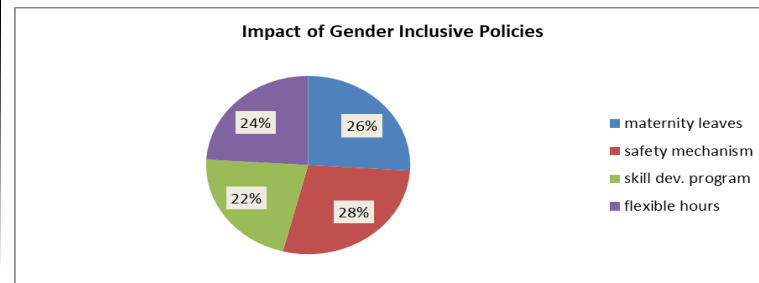


Survey findings:

6.3 Role of Gender-Inclusive Policies



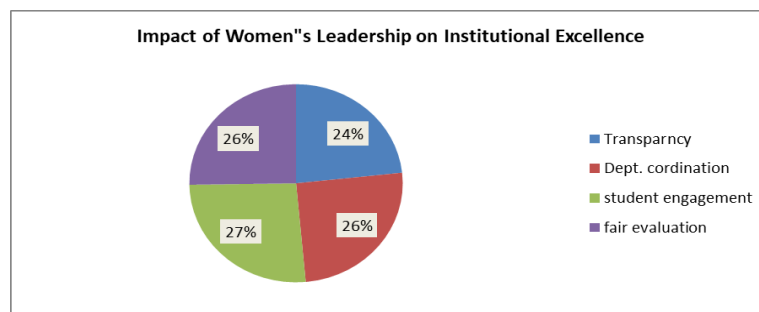
Respondents rated the impact of various policies:
